

Members come from varied background and often many moved to this area from locations outside of Carefree/ Cave Creek and outside of Arizona. The premeeting was an excellent way to meet other people and share experiences. Our club also had additional benefits of coming early to the pre-meeting, and that was the addition of "Music."

Several members were musically inclined and played the piano among other instruments (trumpet, clarinet) and the one I wish to focus on here is the organ. While you could carry a keyboard, trumpet etc., it would not be the case for an organ.

KIWANIS SUPPORTING THE SCOTT FOUNDATION WITH GRANT FOR THEIR CRAZY COMPUTER CAMP

Scott Foundation submitted a request for \$5,310 to the Kiwanis Club of Carefree Funds Request Committee on July 6, 2021 to sponsor a Crazy Computer Building Camp.

The Scott Foundation supports Arizona foster care system youth who typically have many challenges to overcome. Founder and CEO, Colleen Walski, is a Kiwanian. She states that because of their environments these young people have low self-esteem. "They wear used clothing that rarely fits and have a sense of disconnectedness. Many come to us angry and frustrated about their lives and their futures."

What Scott Foundations offers, which others do not, starts with a community of support and the ability for the young people to actually interact with community members who care about them. There are individualized, practical life-skills training to fill the gaps that exist elsewhere and a constant advocacy and support from the leadership team. Work-learn environments help them to see the possibility of multiple career paths utilizing personal development tools of which they often were unaware existed.

The Kiwanis Club of Carefree is formally recognized year-round as a Scott Foundation Community Vision Partner on their website, via a dedicated E-blast sent to their social media following of over 7,000 people. Kiwanis is also recognized on all Scott Foundation social media platforms including Cave Creek Infamous Bulletin Board, Scottsdale Bulletin Board and Rio Verde Foothills Bulletin Board. Along with Press Releases and photos distributed to our media partners, including the local City Sun Times and Sonoran News, following the successful Crazy Computer Camp event.
